On June 1, 2009, the James Island PSD Fire Department received a donation to help save pets' lives. In a joint presentation with St. Andrews and St. Pauls Fire Departments, the James Island PSD Fire Department received four sets of pet oxygen masks. Invisible Fence of Coastal Carolinas donated sets of masks to each department, funding 100% of the costs. The masks, which come in three sizes, are available on units at each station to deliver oxygen when a pet is pulled from a fire.

According to Invisible Fence, more than 40,000 animals succumbed to smoke inhalation in the year 2006. Through their donation, they hope to increase the number of pets saved. Until recently, most agencies were unable to effectively deal with an animal that needed oxygen. The human masks aren't suitable for a pet. "A human mask over the snout of a dog doesn't work and it's even worse on the snout of a cat," Bill Swayne, the President of Invisible Fence for Coastal Carolina said in a news interview. Though humans are still the first priority, the James Island PSD Fire Department is excited to have another tool available to save lives.
